

ME (m)

 She is talking to me in French.

 Il ne t'écrit pas en anglais.
 He is not writing to you in English.

PERSONNE (Subject)	UNIQUE OP DI JOIN (Stressed)	OBJET DIRECT (Direct Objects)	OBJET INDIRECT (Indirect Objects)
JE (I) I speak French.	Hi too, he speaks creole well.	I am hosting them at home.	I'm phoning them from Indiana.
PEUX-TU ? Do you speak English too?	ELLE (she)	Do you understand the grammar rules? Yes, I understand them.	
IL (he) (-m; m) He is from Quebec, he speaks French. I see the book, it is on the table. It is raining.	He bought his ticket before her.		
ELLE (she) (-) She is Senegalese.	At home, in France, we dine late.		
VOUS (you) (m) We like crêpes. French is spoken on the continent. You understand.	US? We are leaving tomorrow.		
ON (we) (m) We like crêpes. French is spoken on the continent. You understand.	After you, I close the doors.		
IL (they) (-m.) They speak too fast!	Because of them, I am changing my itinerary.		
ELLE (they) (-.) They are traveling to the French-speaking African countries.	Thanks to them, I got a good discount.
