This course focuses on what teachers need to know about linguistics to reach English language learners effectively. It includes general and applied linguistics and focuses on the role of language in teaching and learning and implications of effective instruction in culturally and linguistically diverse classrooms.

Recommended prerequisite: ENG-112. Students will take skills learned in ENG 112 and craft the story of one of Marian College's first Black women graduates' (and other persons of color) lives, situating their lives within a broader historical context. Using instruction in investigative journalism and historical research methods, they will work singly and in pairs or triads to research assigned early graduates of Marian College, with the ultimate goal of bringing these women's (and some men's) lives to light. As the inaugural class of Saint Joseph's College of Marian University at Indianapolis, this group's collection of biographical sketches will serve as Saint Joe Indy's gift to Marian University, as Saint Joe students bring to life the history of Marian College's efforts to educate students from underrepresented and marginalized communities, as the rightful heirs or beneficiaries of Marian College's early social justice efforts.
